CIVIL EMERGENCY PROCLAMATION AND EXECUTIVE ORDER REGARDING REGULATION OF CROWDS, MOTOR VEHICLE EXHIBITIONS, AND NOISES ON BUSINESS LOTS IN THE CITY BY MAYOR TIM KELLY FOR THE CITY OF CHATTANOOGA

No. 2025-1

WHEREAS, the Tennessee General Assembly has found and declared that the state is vulnerable to a wide range of emergencies, including natural, technological, terrorist acts, and manmade disasters, all of which threaten the life, health, and safety of its people, damage and destroy property, disrupt services and everyday business and recreational activities, and impede economic growth and development pursuant to Tennessee Code Annotated § 58-2-102; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Tennessee Code Annotated § 58-2-110 (3) and Tennessee Code Annotated § 58-8-104 the Mayor of a municipality has the power and authority to declare a local state of emergency by executive order at any time during the imminent pendency or happening of an occurrence; and

WHEREAS, an occurrence is defined as the imminent threat of an event or an actual event and its aftermath, whether natural or man-made, that could lead to substantial bodily injury or property damage and that could lead to the declaration of a state of emergency under Tennessee Code Annotated § 58-2-102; and

WHEREAS Chattanooga City Code Section 25-75 declares it to be a nuisance for an owner of commercial property to permit commercial property to be used in a way to permit more than thirty (30) people to gather on said property outside of any building during certain hours within two hundred (200) feet of any residence subject to certain conditions; and

WHEREAS Chattanooga City Code Section 25-79 enumerates prohibited noises of amplified music and other excessive noises, which may include motor vehicle speed contests, stunts, burnouts, vehicle doughnuts, drifting, vehicle engine revs, which annoy or disturb the quiet, comfort or repose of persons in any dwelling, or other type of residence in the City under certain conditions other than for special events permits issued by the City pursuant to City Code Section 24-100 for block parties, festivals, and park reservations; and

WHEREAS, as Mayor, I have learned that large public gatherings have been advertised as part of the Riverside Car show in the past without permits which have blocked public access to residential neighborhoods and have caused public safety concerns due to the size of the events throughout the City; and

WHEREAS, as Mayor of the City of Chattanooga I have determined that I should proclaim the existence of a civil emergency based on events that have occurred and may continue to occur from unlawful assembly and may occur in within the City and on commercial properties in close proximity of residential properties if persons refuse to obey an official order to disperse that is issued to maintain public safety in dangerous proximity to an emergency or in violation of City Code which may constitute disorderly conduct in violation of Tennessee Code Annotated§ 38-17-305 et. seq.; and

WHEREAS, I have decided to issue emergency restrictive orders in the interest of public safety based on my proclamation of a civil emergency pursuant to the Tennessee Code Annotated § 38-9-101 et seq. and § 58-2-101 et seq. and City of Chattanooga Charter, Article 2.1, during March 21 and March 22, 2025; and

NOW, THEREFORE, I, TIM KELLY, MAYOR OF THE CITY OF CHATTANOOGA, by virtue of the powers vested in me, proclaim that a local civil emergency exists in the City of Chattanooga, Tennessee and it is my Executive Order to prohibit more than thirty (30) people to gather on commercial property within two hundred (200) feet of any residence in the City subject to certain conditions and I hereby proclaim, direct, and order the following:

- Any owner of commercial property within the City shall not permit commercial property to be used in a way to permit more than thirty (30) people to gather on said property outside of any building and/or which create prohibited noises outside the that may include motor vehicle speed contests, stunts, burnouts, vehicle doughnuts, drifting, vehicle engine revs, or other loud and disruptive noises which annoy or disturb the quiet, comfort or repose of persons in any dwelling, or other type of residence in the City within two hundred (200) feet of the origin of the prohibited noises. This prohibition shall be in effect beginning Friday, March 21, 2025, from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on Sunday, March 23, 2025, for the duration of this Executive Order, but in no event shall this Executive Order exceed fifteen (15) days pursuant to Tennessee Code Annotated § 38-9-103 unless extended by future executive order by the Mayor.
- 2. The Chattanooga police department is authorized to enforce this executive order in the interest of public safety when necessary to issue an official order to disperse that is issued to maintain public safety in proximity to an emergency and to maintain the quiet, comfort and repose of persons in any dwelling from individuals and motor vehicles which create prohibited noises that may include motor vehicle speed contests, stunts, burnouts, vehicle doughnuts, drifting, vehicle engine revs, or other loud and disruptive noises which annoy or disturb the quiet, comfort or repose of persons in any dwelling subject to the conditions allowed for permitted events under City Code Section 24-100. The Chattanooga police department is further authorized to remove individuals and vehicles from City property for the same car related activities during the times set forth in this Executive Order.
- 3. A determination that any provision of this Order is invalid will not affect the enforceability of any other provision of this Order. The remaining provisions shall remain in full force and effect. Any invalid provision will be modified to the extent necessary for enforceability.
- This Order shall be effective at 9:00 a.m. on Friday, March 21, 2025, and shall remain in effect until withdrawn or extended pursuant to Tennessee law.
- 5. PURSUANT TO TENN. CODE ANN. § 38-9-103 the duration of this Civil Emergency Proclamation and Executive Order is limited to fifteen (15) days initially and may be extended, as necessary, in additional fifteen (15)-day increments. To the extent that this Order conflicts with any prior Orders by my office this Order shall control.
